

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










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SAME AS THE BIG TOWNS












Project Updates


- City House Project

Transportation System Plan Update



- Total cost likely \$100k +
- Total time likely 1 year +
- \$35k grant through AAMPO, increasing ask to \$90k
- Could apply for TGM grant, would push back start date
- CFEC compliant

- Complete work before July meeting



- Received three bids on March 18th

Jacobs/CH2M Contract Amendment

- Contract for on-call engineering services

- "Any hourly, non-exempt employee required to work on a holiday will receive time and a half for the hours worked in addition to the holiday pay."




